

TIPS
V33063 –Set of 2 KitchenStone and 2 BathStone Cleaning Blocks

- Block can be used on wet or dry surfaces
- The stone should be used wet if the surface that is to be cleaned is already wet
- The stone may turn from dry to wet depending on what you are cleaning, if this occurs simply rinse off the stone when you are done
- Apply gentle pressure when scrubbing. Use the same amount of pressure that you would use when applying a bar of soap on your hands
- Apply pressure evenly so as not to wear down stone on one side versus the other
- Use long stokes to get the maximum affect
- Simply dust or rinse stone after cleaning
- Using a cloth or water remove residue from the cleaning surface when finished

- If there is a surface that you are unsure of, test it on a small area of the surface to determine abrasive resistance. If the stone does scratch the surface, refrain from using it on this surface.
